A Look Back! .... On October 27, 2019, the Lakewood Heritage Commission and Lakewood Historical Society sponsored a program on former heavyweight boxing champion Joe Louis. Ms. Khadi Madama, whose father was a professional boxer, knew Joe Louis quite well. In her detailed presentation to a room full of guests, she discussed Joe Louis' humble beginnings in Alabama, the trek north to Detroit, Michigan, and his venture into boxing. She presented her excellent discussion on his life in an informal—seminar type setting with a great deal of audience participation. When serving in the armed forces during World War II, reporters asked Joe Louis about the United States involvement in the war, his response was, "There are a lot of things wrong with the United States, but there is nothing that Hitler can fix." This cryptic comment exemplifies Joe Louis at his best. He did not get on a soap box and make blithe comments, but was sincere and honest in his dealings.

A good part of the discussion centered on the second Louis-Schmeling fight. Nazi propagandists predicted that a Schmeling victory over an African-American would be proof of their doctrine of Aryan Supremacy. When Schmeling arrived in New York, the Nazi propagandists issued a statement that a Black man could not defeat Schmeling and that when Schmeling won, the government would use his prize money to build tanks. We do know that Joe Louis knocked him out in two minutes and four seconds of the first round. After the third knockdown, Schmeling's trainer threw in the towel. We should note that Schmeling was not a Nazi. In fact, he angered the Nazi party by refusing to join in 1935. He hid two Jewish boys in his Berlin apartment during the 1938 Kristallnacht pogrom, reportedly used his influence to save Jewish friends from concentration camps, refused to fire his Jewish manager, Joe Jacobs, and divorce his Czech born wife, film star, Anny Dudra. 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In addition, I am happy to report that graduates of the Lakewood High School Classes of 1967, 1968, and 1969 celebrated their "50ish Reunion." Equally pleasant to us was that many of these classmates were able to visit the Museum, recall the halcyon days of Lakewood during their youth, and see the progress we are making in restoring Lakewood history for everyone.

Finally, in late October '21. Michael Zeichner and Brenda Bell, who are Lakewood High School graduates from 1977, visited the Museum for a tour. As we reminisced about Lakewood High School and Lakewood in general, Michael discussed the Lakewood High School Marching Band Trip to California during our Bicentennial Celebration in 1976. Our LHS band marched in the Rose Bowl with a sister school--- Lakewood High School of California. Many interesting stories about this momentous event came up, and I asked Michael to write his story down so that we can publish it in an upcoming edition of the Horse and Carriage. I want to carry this further and ask any former band member who made this trip to write their story and submit it to our newsletter as well. This is living history!

In the past we have had some families write their history or their story about their life in Lakewood. We are welcoming you to provide us with some of your experiences. At many of the Lakewood High School Alumni Hall of Fame and Lakewood High School Athletic Hall of Fame luncheons, virtually all the inductees expressed how grateful they were to grow up in Lakewood. As Lakewood inspired them, it inspired me as well. I still bleed Lakewood Blue—I hope that you do, too!
